Prerequisites and special admittance requirements

For admission to the course, knowledge equivalent to a bachelor's degree is required, which must include at least 90 credits in geology, geosciences, biogeochemistry, or environmental science. English 6 or equivalent.

Course content

The course adresses:

- interactions between the different components of the Earth's climate system (atmosphere, biosphere, lithosphere, cryosphere, hydrosphere)
- the development of the Earth's climate system on geological timescales
- the use of paleoenvironmental archives including terrestrial and marine sediment sequences as well as ice cores
- the evaluation and interpretation of paleoclimatic proxy data

Learning outcomes

After completing the course, the student is expected to be able to:

- describe the drivers and factors controlling processes in past climates
- describe how climatic information from paleoenvironmental archives is extracted and interpreted
- independently search for and find relevant literature
- evaluate scientific information that describes paleoclimatic data
- present scientific information in both written and oral forms

Education

The course consists of lectures, seminars, independent project and a group project. Participation in seminars and projects is compulsory. In the event of special circumstances, the examiner may, after consultation with the teacher concerned, grant a student exemption from the obligation to participate in certain compulsory instruction. The teaching language is English.

Forms of examination

- a. Knowledge assessment and examination are in the form of written and oral examinations.
- b. Grades will be set according to a seven-point scale related to the learning objectives of the course:
- A = Excellent
- B = Very good
- C = Good
- D = Satisfactory
- E = Adequate
- Fx = Fail, some additional work required
- F = Fail, much additional work required
- c. The grading criteria will be distributed at the beginning of the course.
- d. In order to pass the course, students must receive the minimum passing grade E on all course units and participate in all mandatory instruction.
- e. Students who receive a failing grade on a regular examination are allowed to retake the examination as long as the course is still provided. The number of examination opportunities is not limited. Other mandatory course elements are equated with examinations. A student who has received a passing grade on an examination may not retake the examination to attain a higher grade. A student who has failed the same examination twice is entitled to have another examiner appointed, unless there are special reasons to the contrary. Such requests should be made to the department board.
- g. There is no facility to improve the grade Fx to a pass grade in this course.

Interim

Students may request that the examination be conducted in accordance with this course plan even after it has ceased to be valid. However, this may not take place more than three times over a two-year period after course instruction has ended. Requests must be made to the department board. The provision also applies in the case of revisions to the course plan.

Limitations

The course may not be included in degree with Paleoclimatology and the ocean system (GG7012) or equivalent.

Misc

The course is part of the Master Programme in Geological Science, but can also be read as a separate course.

Required reading

The course literature is decided by the department board and published on the Department of Geological Sciences website at least two months before the start of the course.
